The initial sections of the book describe the cognitive structure of reading and the cognitive foundation upon which that structure is built. This is followed by discussions of how an understanding of these cognitive requirements can be used in practice with standards, assessments, curriculum and instruction, to advance the teaching of reading and the delivery of interventions for students who encounter difficulties along the way. The book focuses on reading in English as its exemplar, but shows how its framework can be adapted to understand the broad cognitive requirements for reading and learning to read in any phonologically-based orthography. It provides a way for reading professionals to think about reading and its development and gives them mechanisms that, coupled with such understanding, will help them link what children must know to become strong readers to what teaching can best provide through the competent use of available tools. In this way, the book will help reading professionals be both efficient and effective in what they provide all their students and be much better equipped to support those students who struggle to learn to read.

This inquiry focused on using a combination of Readers' theater and daily timed reads to assess whether they would enhance students' fluency rate and comprehension skills. The study took place in a K-5 Title 1 school, in a self-contained English only third grade classroom with 20 students. The focus students were five Beginning to Early Intermediate English Language Learners who had been in a bilingual program since kindergarten. The intervention lasted a period of three weeks for approximately 30 minutes per session. It utilized stories adapted into scripts from the Open Court curriculum. These adaptations required adding dialogue, characters to one selection and other adjustments for play-like scripts. In addition, daily timed readings were employed using the weekly selections as fluency passages. Data sets include pre and post unit assessments used by the district, weekly fluency assessments, and weekly comprehension assessments. Results showed that Readers' theater combined with timed reads increased students' fluency rate. More specifically, there was an increased range of 2 to 11 Words per Minute after intervention in focus students. Readers' theater also increased students' engagement with the weekly selections as they showed increased motivation during the intervention. Comprehension assessments did not show increased comprehension skills due to the lack of comparability of the assessments used to verify an increase in this skill.

Reading fluency has been identified as a key component of proficient reading. Research has consistently demonstrated significant and substantial correlations between reading fluency and overall reading achievement. Despite the great potential for fluency to have a significant outcome on students' reading achievement, it continues to be not well understood by teachers, school administrators and policy makers. The chapters in this volume examine reading fluency from a variety of perspectives. The initial chapter sketches the history of fluency as a literacy instruction component. Following chapters examine recent studies and approaches to reading fluency, followed by chapters that explore actual fluency instruction models and the impact of fluency instruction. Assessment of reading fluency is critical for monitoring progress and identifying students in need of intervention. Two articles on assessment, one focused on word recognition and the other on prosody, expand our understanding of fluency measurement. Finally, a study from Turkey explores the relationship of various reading competencies, including fluency, in an integrated model of reading. Our hope for this volume is that it may spark a renewed interest in research into reading fluency and fluency instruction and move toward making fluency instruction an even more integral part of all literacy instruction.
