

The Pearl By John Steinbeck Book Analysis Detaile

John Steinbeck's *The Pearl* includes many references to songs that accompany the perceptions of a central character named, Kino. It is important to note that the writer used the term "song" and as such implied something greater than a single musical note, chord, or phrase. He was referring to a streaming complex of feeling tones-- a melody or song. Such streaming influences from the unconscious may impact an individual's perception, judgment, decisions, and conclusions often before they are able to explain their reaction. While many can relate to such experiences, understanding the source and purpose could enrich the experience. How the unconsciously inspired influences impact us depends upon our individual adult maturity, functional style, and attitude. An example of such influences are regularly employed in film and stage plays. To unify an influence among individual audience members, a well developed film or stage play's musical score serves to bring together audience feeling tones to support a scene. It may dramatically increase the viewing experience across a wide range of individual styles. This essay introduces the conceptual tools to build an understanding and appreciation for such influences. The essay could be used as supporting evidence for greater funding for the arts in education.

Perrault's *Fairy Tales* was originally written in 1697 by Charles Perrault. He was a French author and member of the Académie française. He laid the foundations for a new literary genre, the fairy tale, with his works derived from pre-existing folk tales. The *Thirty Four Illustrations* by Gustave Dore from the 'Volume *Les Contes de Perrault Dessins*' by Gustave Dore, 1867. The best known of his tales include *Le Petit Chaperon rouge* (Little Red Riding Hood), *Cendrillon* (Cinderella), *Le Chat Botté* (Puss in Boots) and *La Barbe bleue* (Bluebeard). Many of Perrault's stories were rewritten by the Brothers Grimm, continue to be printed and have been adapted to opera, ballet (such as Tchaikovsky's *The Sleeping Beauty*), theatre, and film (Disney). Perrault was an influential figure in the 17th century French literary scene, and was the leader of the Modern faction during the Quarrel of the Ancients and the Moderns. John Steinbeck wrote *The Grapes of Wrath* during an astonishing burst of activity between June and October of 1938. Throughout the time he was creating his greatest work, Steinbeck faithfully kept a journal revealing his arduous journey toward its completion. The journal, like the novel it chronicles, tells a tale of dramatic proportions—of dogged determination and inspiration, yet also of paranoia, self-doubt, and obstacles. It records in intimate detail the conception and genesis of *The Grapes of Wrath* and its huge though controversial success. It is a unique and penetrating portrait of an emblematic

American writer creating an essential American masterpiece.

The name Lazarist originates from St. Lazare, the original Motherhouse in Paris of the Congregation of the Mission of St. Vincent de Paul. St. Vincent de Paul founded the Congregation of the Mission in 1625. With the cooperation of St. Louise de Marillac, he also founded the Congregation of the Daughters of Charity.
